How can my employees file for unemployment?

I am having a hard time getting through to the Unemployment Office, what should I do?

The Unemployment Office is experiencing high call volumes so expect to wait for a minimum of an hour and a half once you are connected. If you keep getting a busy signal when calling, try calling after 8pm. Michigan officials have suggested filing unemployment claims online for faster service. Read more here.

What is the MEDC grant and loan program?

The Michigan Small Business Relief Grant Program Applications are to be submitted to the Dickinson Area Economic Development Alliance for Dickinson County and will be forwarded to a regional group who will review the applications and make the final determinations. These grants are up to \$10,000. Submission deadline is 11:59 p.m. EST. on Sunday, April 5, 2020.

The Michigan Small Business Relief Loan* program is providing low-interest loan funding to eligible borrowers. The loans are for a minimum of \$50,000 and are capped at \$200,000. Click here for additional terms under this loan program.

What is the Alliance's role in the MEDC grant funding?

We are the clearinghouse for grant application in Dickinson County. There is \$500,000 in total funding for the entire Upper Peninsula. Grantees will be selected, based on strict criteria, by a committee at the regional level.

What businesses are eligible for the MEDC funding?

Businesses listed in Governor Whitmer's Executive Order 2020-20 are eligible to apply for the MEDC funding. Below is a list of those businesses. The grant qualifications can be found here. Eligible Business means a business that:

- The company is in an industry outlined in Executive Order 2020-9, or any subsequent Executive Order of similar intent ("EO"), or demonstrates it is otherwise affected by the COVID-19 outbreak, that meets one or more of the following: provides support to impacted employees, is located in a downtown district or high impact corridor or has 50 employees or less, or is a company that provides services to companies outlined in the EO and requires additional employees to support to companies or employees impacted by EO
- The company has 50 employees or less

- The company needs working capital to support payroll expenses, rent, mortgage payments, utility expenses, or other similar expenses that occur in the ordinary course of business
- The company is able to demonstrate an income loss as a result of the EO, or the COVID-19 outbreak.

How do I apply for an SBA Disaster Loan?

How do I meet the notification requirement for my essential employees?

If your business is considered an essential business under Governor Whitmer's Executive Order 2020-21 (COVID-19) you are responsible for informing your workers of that designation. Businesses and operations must make such designations in writing, whether by electronic message, public website, or other appropriate means. Such designations, however, may be made orally until March 31, 2020 at 11:59 pm. Here are some sample letters.
